Topic: Teaching Elementary School Students to Be Effective Writers

Practice: Writing Process

This writer's workshop lesson plan and associated activities introduces a "writing buddies" format for providing feedback.

The lesson begins with the teacher sharing a book with students as an example of helping others, then the teacher and students review how the teacher helps with writing assignments. The teacher then introduces students to the *Writing Buddies* form and gives the expectations for the activity (e.g., "writing buddies will read their stories aloud to each other"). The teacher models the process by presenting a writing sample and having the students provide their feedback. Students are then paired together to brainstorm their writing ideas using the Possible Questions component of this form. After students develop their writings, they are paired with their buddies again to suggest revisions according to the My Writing Checklist.

Using the My Writing Checklist allows students to compare their own assessment of their writing to that from their buddies and teacher. This helps students learn to judge the quality of their writing. Buddies can

work off the included list of possible questions when discussing nonfiction, personal narrative, or opinion writing pieces.

This sample material, the referenced picture book, and activities are appropriate to the primary grade levels, as demonstrated by the first grade teachers in this video. To adapt this activity to upper elementary grade levels, consider different read aloud materials as well as expansion of activities to include revising, editing, and reflection with buddies.

Introducing Writing Buddies

Mini-Lesson	Lesson Summary	Materials
Introducing Writing Buddies	 Read Aloud Officer Buckle and Gloria by Peggy Rathman. Discuss how Gloria helps Officer Buckle during his assemblies (She helps make them more interesting). Review the ways students have been helping the teacher revise or make his/her stories better. Adding details Adding interesting words Stretching out words to spell 	CLORID MILETERIA
	Explain that the students are going to be assigned a writing buddy today. They will work with their writing buddy to help make their stories better.	
	 Brainstorm a list of what writing buddies will look like in the classroom. Writing buddies will sit next to each other. Writing buddies will read their stories aloud to each other. Writing buddies will circle misspelled words with a green pen and then help each other stretch out these words to spell them. Writing buddies will circle overused words with a red pen and then help each other replace them with more interesting words. Writing buddies will ask questions to help their partner add details to make their story better. 	
	 Assign buddies to students or allow them to choose their own buddy. Have volunteers to come up and demonstrate how to work with your writing buddy for the class. Guide them as they work to ensure students are having good conversations about their writing as they work. Repeat this process daily until students have grasped this concept. 	
	Release students to write. Have them move their name to Share with writing buddy on the writing process chart before getting with their writing buddy. Continue to monitor buddies throughout the year to ensure that they stay on task.
