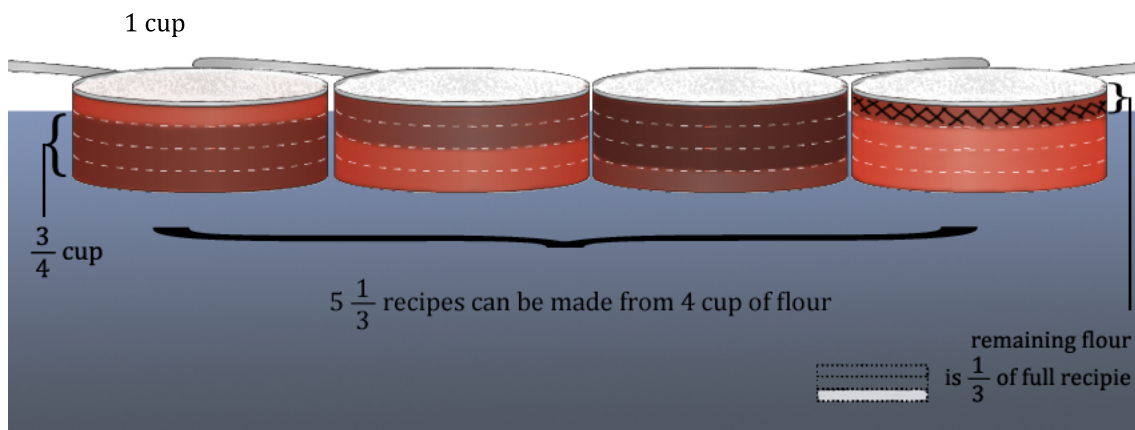
Partitive and Measurement Fraction Problems

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Topic: Developing Effective Fractions Instruction for K-8
