## Student Account

As a College Summit student, you get to create an online account. You will save all of your portfolio tasks to this account so that your College Summit Advisor can monitor the progress of your work and communicate important information to you.

#### **How to Create a Student Account**

- 1. Navigate to www.csnav.org
- 2. Click "Create Your Account"
- 3. Crossland's System Key is: daa8c1w1n5
- 4. At the page asking "Who Are You," select "High School Student"
- 5. On the next screen, indicate your date of birth. Click the FIND button and select "Crossland High School"
- 6. At the "Account Information" page, indicated your graduation year to ensure CSNav is tailored to you
- 7. To create your account name, use YOUR FIRST AND MIDDLE INITIAL with your LAST NAME and GRADUATION YEAR. For example: Jon Jacob Smith = jjsmith10
- 8. Select and enter one of the following as your security question: In what city where you born? What is your mother's maiden name? What is your high school mascot? What was your first pet's name?
- 9. Check the box after you read the privacy policy and terms of use
- 10. Once your account is created, navigate to "Your Portfolio > Your Profile"
- 11. Click on the basics and fill out each of three badges by clicking Edit. Don't forget to save!
